50th Annual Meeting – August 11, 2016

A Few of TLA's Accomplishments for 2016

- 1. **Fish Shelters Project:** We wrapped up this 5-year project in the fall of 2016 with the installation of a final set of fish shelters in Torch Lake. Each of the 80 authorized sites on the five participating lakes (Intermediate, Bellaire, Clam, Torch, and Elk) received two or three hand-made fish shelters; wood crates filled with brush, or slab trees, which significantly increased the fish habitat. Many thanks to dozens of volunteers and discounted commercial contributions.
- 2. TCE Plume: For the last 12 years TLA has been the catalyst for an informal group of stakeholders (Antrim County United Through Ecology = ACUTE) to engage the community and units of government regarding the funding for two construction projects to shield the Mancelona public water system from TCE contamination. The construction projects were based on multiple consensus-building meetings with the lead engineering firm, DEQ, the Mancelona public water system, and area stakeholder organizations. The two projects were installing a connecting water main & pressure pumps, and building a large storage tank so the Cedar River Well Field can be pumped slowly from a deep aquifer. Additional construction projects may be needed by 2024 or 2025.
- 3. Large Woody Debris Project: In response to TLA's multi-year investigations of sedimentation in Grass River, a collaborative pilot project was cosponsored with TLA, the County, and several private firms to determine if strategically placed Large Woody Debris structures (secured whole trees) could redirect enough of the river current toward the main channel to scour some of the accumulated sediment from the channel, and to encourage the depositing of some sediment downstream of the structures. This is a slow process, but preliminary findings indicate some success. TLA purchased new laser-based survey equipment to more accurately measure changes in the river channel.
- 4. **Golden Brown benthic Algae**: TLA is blazing a research trail to determine the root causes of this benthic algae (assemblages of diatoms) growth on the near-shore rocks and sand around most, if not all, lakes in NW Michigan. Based on a viable hypothesis suggested by an MSU professor, TLA is coordinating a collaborative project this summer with volunteers and funds from TLA, Elk-Skegemog Lakes Association, Lake Leelanau Lake Association, and Torch Lake Protective Alliance to track the monthly trend in soluble reactive phosphorus in the groundwater. A decreasing concentration of this critical nutrient during the summer would be consistent with this hypothesis, i.e. that the naturally occurring diatoms growing in sand start growing on sand & rocks in response to their consumption of too much of the available phosphorus just below the near-shore lake bottom. Samples of groundwater are being collected using dialysis bags filled with distilled water and then analyzed at U of M's Biological Res. Station in Pellston.


